## **Branch Secretary's report**

At the AGM in February 2013 were 28 Branch members and there were the following changes in branch officers: Secretary Rob Needham; Joint Deputy Ringing Masters Simon C Farrar and Graham E Slade; Bookstall Officer Pam & Andrew Elliston; no Ringing Master was elected. Twelve new members were elected. The AGM included two short talks by different members on their recruitment and ITTS training experience.

The Captain at Binfield tower, John Harper, had to stand down on health grounds and Dave Creasy stepped into his shoes. Binfield has several learners, and they benefit from attending the weekday Branch Practice (BP) held at Binfield on the first Tuesday afternoon of each month. The best attendance figure at the weekday BP at Binfield was 15.

St. Mary's, Twyford have done a DIY installation of a sound control system for the tower. Designed, built and installed by the ringers, it is very effective and it has reduced the sound level near the tower by about 20 decibels when the shutters are closed.

In April Easthampstead ringers tied in a ringing outing with travelling on the Watercress Line railway. The outing was very well attended to the extent that the ringers were given a whole carriage to themselves.

Our 6-bell striking competition was held at Sandhurst on April 20<sup>th</sup>. Five teams took part and it was really good to see several youngsters involved in the competition. The winning band was All Saints, Wokingham with 16 faults.

On April 27<sup>th</sup> two towers, Waltham St. Lawrence and Sonning, combined forces for an outing to four towers in the Devizes area. There were 17 ringers on the outing and as well as ringing at two 6-bell and two 8-bell towers, Tony & Alison Evans provided a welcome morning-coffee break, and we had a long, sociable lunch at a nearby pub.

The Sonning bell ringers organised a fund-raising Bric-a-Brac sale in the Woodley shopping centre in May, and in spite of it being a weekday with quite cold weather it was reasonably well attended. The proceeds were split three ways between the ODG Bell Fund, St. Andrew's bell fund, and the Sonning Deanery Branch account.

All Saints Wokingham went on an outing in June to the West Sussex area, and on 2<sup>nd</sup> June they rang a quarter peal of Yorkshire Surprise Major for the 60th anniversary of the Queen's Coronation Day.

David Sullivan stood down as captain at Wargrave and the bell-ringing band is now run jointly by Lavinia Sullivan and John Coombes. Lavinia does the teaching at practice nights and John does the management, administration and secretarial work.

Warfield church underwent extensive restoration and improvement work since April and the tower was closed all summer. Binfield kindly accepted the Warfield ringers as visitors during this time.

It is with sadness that I have to record that John Harper died of cancer in July. On July 15<sup>th</sup> Binfield ringers were joined by many others from the area to ring the bells at the service of thanksgiving for John's life. In the following week two quarter peals were rung to commemorate and celebrate his time with us as a bell ringer. John was elected Tower Captain of Binfield in 2007 and he spent many hours training new ringers, several of whom are now valuable members of a revitalised band.

Towards the end of July various towers rang quarter peals to celebrate the birth of HRH Prince George: All Saints Wokingham, Sonning, and White Waltham are ones I was told about.

There were family events to celebrate with ringing in the summer. In August a quarter peal of *Wells Surprise Minor* was rung at Easthampstead to celebrate the birth of Eloise Sophie Curtis Wells on Aug 8th. On Saturday 21st September bells rang out at St. Paul's, Wokingham to celebrate the marriage of Elizabeth Davenport, a St. Paul's ringer. A peal of Yorkshire Surprise Major was rung on the Saturday morning of the wedding. The following Thursday a quarter peal was rung at Binfield to celebrate her marriage, in which her mother, father and brother took part.

In August Twyford & Hurst combined bands had a grand ringing day in the City of London. They began with the ground floor ring of 6 bells at St Katherine Cree, then to the 8 bells of St Olave Hart Street, next the magnificent tower of 12 bells at St Magnus the Martyr, and finally the bells of St James Garlickhythe where the Royal Jubilee bells are hung.

Two towers in the branch achieved Tower Maintenance Awards during the year: Sonning and Wargrave; congratulations to them both.

The branch's 8-bell striking competition in October did not take place for lack of teams. Next year the 8-bell striking competition is going to be a combined Reading Branch and Sonning Deanery Branch joint competition.

In November Eddie Martin died in the USA while undergoing an operation for an aortic aneurism. Eddie and his wife Ann were loyal ringers at Easthampstead for 6 years. Eddie actively encouraged tower and hand bell ringing. He will be particularly remembered for his expertise in conducting Stedman. His ringing compositions are well known in the exercise.

In January seven members of the branch attended the one-day ITTS "How to Teach Bell Handling" course at St. Helens Abingdon and all thought that it was an excellent course.

### **Training report**


This report serves two purposes. It is the Training Co-ordinator's report to the AGM. It is also the Branch report to the annual Guild Training meeting.

Courses – For the second year running the Branch ran no courses. My only excuse is pressure of other activities.

Details of courses offered, and an on-line application form are on the website at: <a href="http://www.sdb.odg.org.uk/training/">http://www.sdb.odg.org.uk/training/</a>. There are status reports on each course (when last rung and how many waiting). Most courses have only one or two people waiting. The lists are probably out of date, and should be reviewed.

For the last few years the number of Branch members wanting to attend a Maintenance course seems to be down to a trickle – too few to ask the Guild Towers & Bellfries Committee (which runs the courses) to put one on for us – so we have directed our members to the courses that the Committee has run elsewhere in the Guild.

**Practices** – Average attendances at mid-week daytime practices is similar to last year but attendance at Saturday practices and the AGM is down slightly (though still higher than the previous two years). Only two mid-week practices were cancelled for lack of support.



Note: February is the AGM. There are no Saturday figures for April (striking competition). There was no weekday practice in July & November.

**10-bell ringing** – We have been attempting to ring a monthly 10-bell quarter peal with mainly Branch bands. Six were rung up to August, but none have been rung since.

**Inter-tower assistance** – As in previous years, several Branch members are involved in helping with the tuition of ringers from other towers, either at the learner's tower or by inviting learners to sessions at their own tower.

**Concerns** – Few of the bands in the Branch would consider themselves as 'strong' and several rely on support from other towers.

We failed to elect a ringing master this year, and as a result have been operating with two deputies, which is not the ideal arrangement.


I have held the post of training co-ordinator since it was created in 2003, having done the job unofficially for the previous ten years since Hugh Baxter stood down as Ringing Master. I have tried to continue the system that Hugh introduced where we asked members what courses they would like and then organised courses around their needs. The main demand has always been for skills courses with hardly any requests for courses in specific methods of the type run by the Guild. Over the years this approach has enabled us to run far more courses than would have been practical for a small branch using the traditional model of fixing the course and a date and waiting to see who applies. I hope that this approach will be continued and revitalised by my successor.

### Webmaster/Postmaster Report for 2013

Website – The website has been kept up to date throughout the year, with periodic additions. The site includes full contact details for officers, an on-line diary, contact details for towers, with organised by practice night, number of bells and map, details of training courses (with an application form), full list of all Branch and Guild services, copies of all newsletters since 2005, reference documents, reports and pictures of events, the history of the Branch, and a list of useful ringing links. I have monitored usage of the website since late July 2012. During 2013 there were nearly 4350 page hits — an average of over 12 per day. 870 documents were downloaded, slightly over half of them newsletters. If all the newsletters are downloaded by members, that corresponds to 87% of members downloading each quarter's newsletter.



**E-mail lists** – I manage four Branch e-mail lists (Members, Officers, Towers & Wedding volunteers) and provide assistance if required for the four tower lists hosted by the Branch (Easthampstead, Twyford, Warfield and Wokingham All Saints).

I try to keep the addresses on the list up to date and complete, but I can only do so when given the information. the number of members on the list is almost the same as last year (136) but we have /// more members /// tower correspondents to check that all their members were on the members e-mail list. ////I suspect that the number with no e-mail is fewer than 20%, so we could probably add more, if I knew about them.

Please tell me if your e-mail address changes. If you manage a tower e-mail list, please tell me when you change anyone's address – changes you make don't automatically get copied to the members' distribution list.

I occasionally respond to other Guild members running websites and/or mailing lists asking for help.
